Projected Cost Increase

Declining Enrollment

- School Enrollment numbers have been declining across all the districts in the North Shore, not just Georgetown.
- Total Georgetown enrollment down 23.5% over last 10 years
- Georgetown HS (9-12) enrollment down 42.6% over last 10 years
- Declining enrollment means less State funding

Projected Increasing Costs

 Like everything, costs continue to rise and school districts aren't immune to this (increased salary & wages and supplies & services)



Socio-economic shifts

G'town Socio-economic Shift over last 10 years

- Median Home prices up 88% vs 2016 in Georgetown
- Median Household income in Georgetown is
 1.5x higher than the Essex county average
- Non-public education options more accessible
- As enrollment has decreased in surrounding towns, more school choice options have opened up

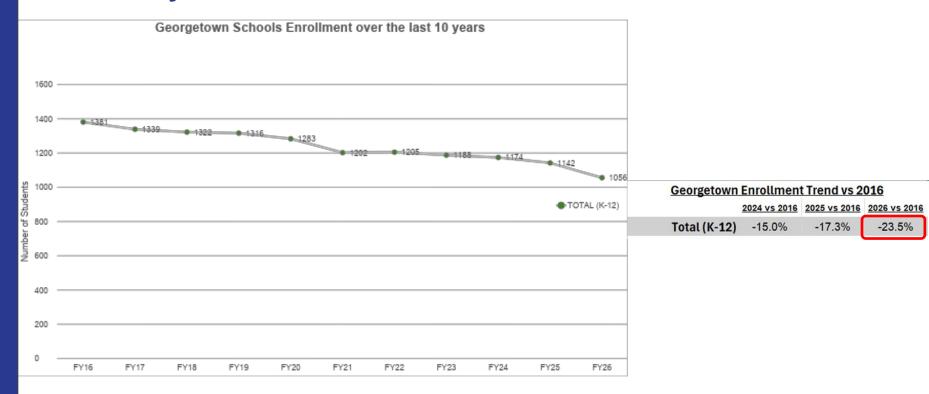

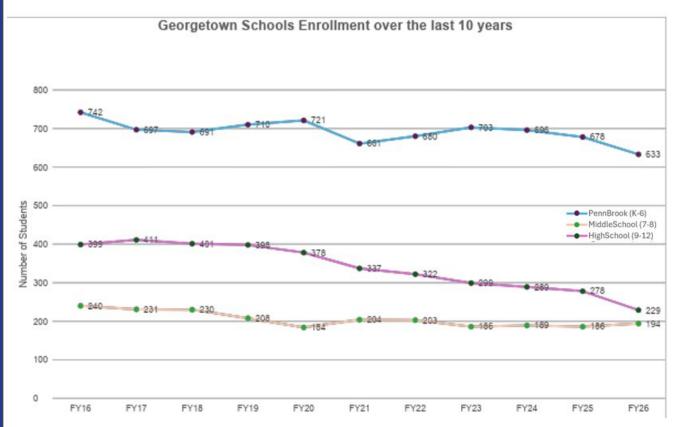

10 yr Enrollment Trend – Total District K-12

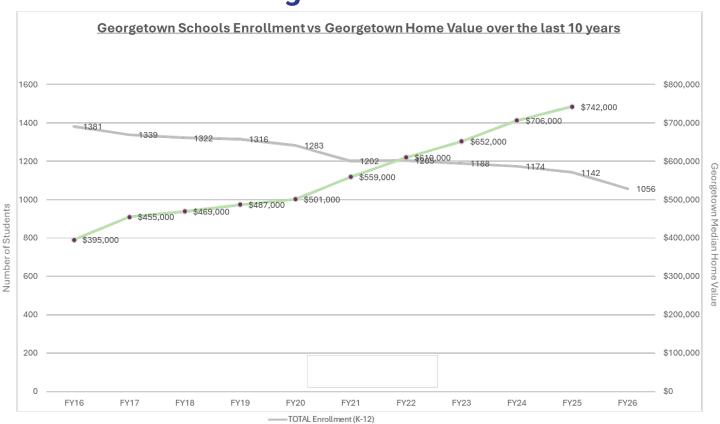


10 yr Enrollment Trend - Penn Brook / Middle School / High School

Median Home Value

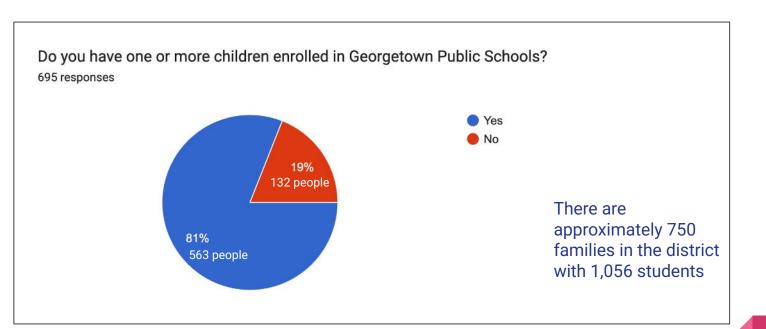
As home prices go up, it changes the socio-economic profile of the town, creating a scenario where non-public education becomes more accessible

The work up to this point

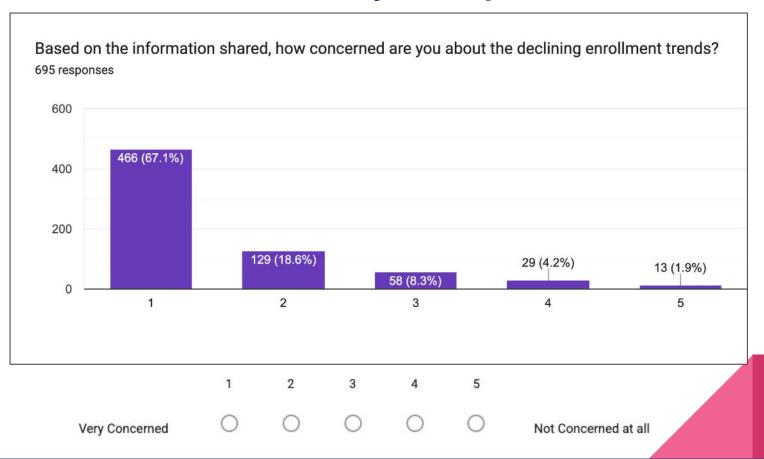
- High School Redesign initiatives are underway with no plans to slow down
- Community Data Collection over last two months
 - Survey delivered this fall with regular reminders to GPS families.
 - Collaboration with the town to execute the survey with the greater Georgetown community
 - 695 Respondents
- Community Conversations
 - A series of 6 Conversations (approximately 200 participants) during October taking place at various locations and various times of the day to maximize participation and give everyone the chance to be heard
- Identification of potential partnering districts
- Collaboration with other town boards/committees

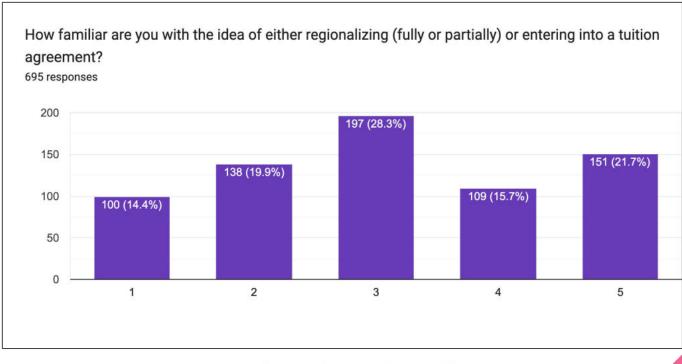
Data Review-Community Perception & Awareness

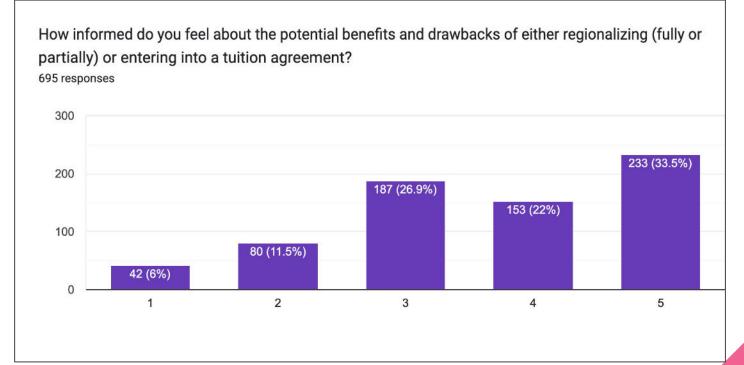

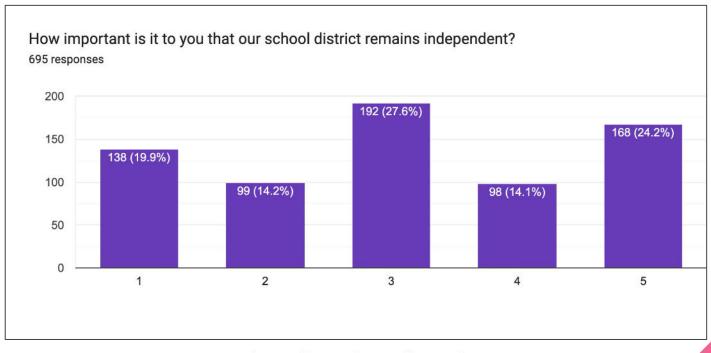

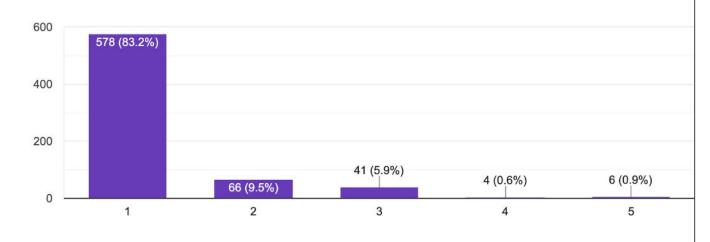

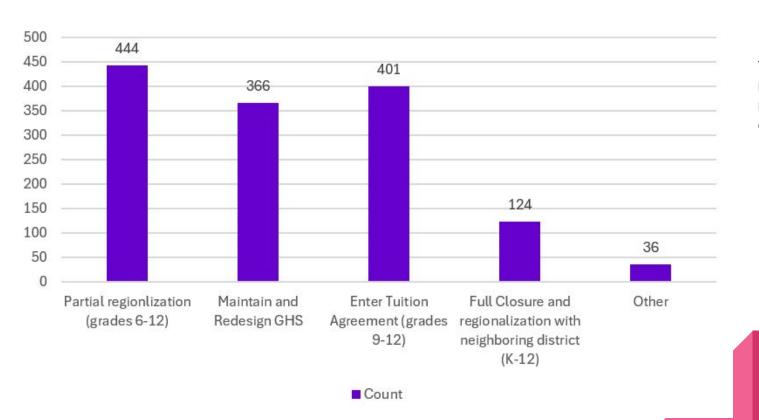

How important is it to you that Georgetown students have access to strong academic programs, sports, and extracurricular opportunities, even if that means partnering with other districts?

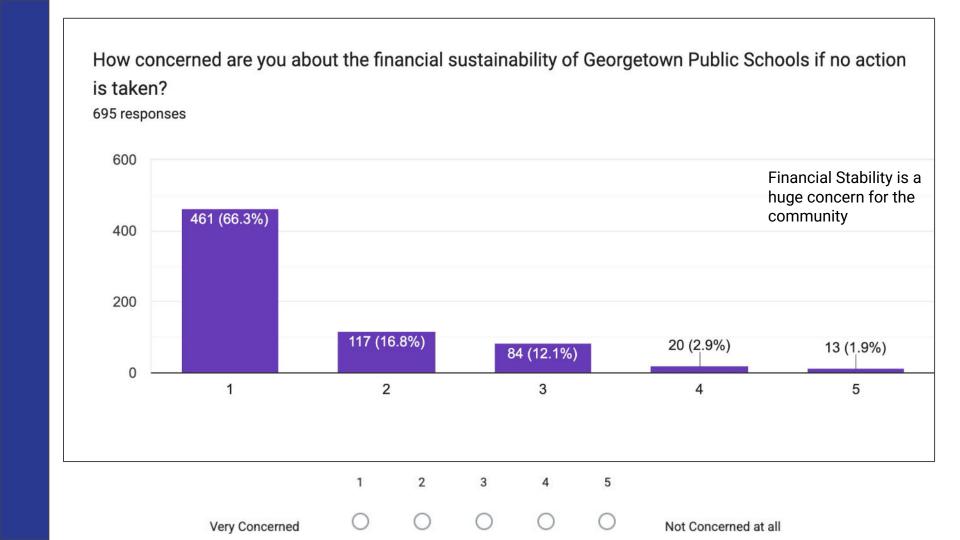

#	Category	% of Total	Description
1	Community & Transparency Concerns	38%	Asking for more communication, community involvement, and transparency in decision-making about GHS's future.
2	Support for Teachers, Students, and School Culture	16%	Focused on valuing teachers, supporting students, improving morale, and fostering a positive school environment.
3	Facilities & General School Issues	13%	Comments about physical space, school size, and general district concerns.
4	Academic & Extracurricular Quality	10%	Emphasis on maintaining or expanding academic programs, sports, and clubs despite enrollment challenges.
5	Regionalization & Cost Analysis	7%	Focused on understanding the financial and logistical implications of regionalization.
6	Regionalization / Tuition Options	6%	Questions or suggestions about regionalizing or entering tuition agreements.
7	Financial Accountability / Override	6%	Concern over financial management, taxes, and how overrides and funds are used.
8	Process, Timeline, and Long-Term Planning	4%	Requests for clarity on decision timelines and long-term planning.

- Director of Innovative Learning and Student Support hired this fall
- Creative bell schedule allowing for flexible scheduling
- Solving transportation needs
- Guidance Department redesign

Building Partnerships

- With our students (Understanding what they want)
- With Municipal departments (Internship pilots)
- With Local businesses (internships pilots)
- With Community College expansion

What's Coming Next

Flexible scheduling for students and staff

- Advisory for Middle and High School students to build knowledge and skills
- High School students could earn credits "in the world"
 - Deep internships
 - Early College expansion
- Staffing model shifts

Tuition Agreement - MASCO

How Does it Work?

- Identify a partner that could absorb our High School student population (9-12)
- Financial model is developed and agreed upon by both districts with an eye to regionalization
- MASCO obtains approval from regional School Committee and ¾ of the towns need to approve as part of the operating budget at the annual Town Meeting obtains approval from their School Committee
- GPS develops an operational plan including Transportation, etc.
- Decision making authority lies with the Georgetown School Committee with community input
- Approval from the Commissioner of the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education
- Time Frame a partnership could be completed with in the academic year

Tuition Agreement - MASCO

Pros

- Timeliness
- Peer Groups: Increased graduating class size
- Opportunities
 - Sports
 - Extracurricular activities
 - Academic Electives
- Sustainable over time even with declining enrollment
- Impact on students in grades 9 12 only

Cons

- No Governance or authority (for Georgetown)
 - No guarantee of joining the regionalization
- Georgetown Community loses the pride of independent varsity sports
- Impact on students who want/need small town feel - not a good fit for all students
 - Loss of familiar teachers and staff
- Location -
 - Loss of students connection to small town feel of Georgetown
 - Transported out of Georgetown

Potential Option #3

Regionalization

Amesbury - Georgetown Regional School District





Regionalization - Amesbury/Georgetown

How Does it Work

- Identify a partner(s) that are interested in creating a new regional school district
- Feasibility study (6-8 month timeline)
- Process is governed by regulations with a 3 phase process
 - Phase I: 3 person committee is formed in each town/city
 - Phase II: the committees form a board
 - o Phase III: The board creates the structures and details of the new regional school district
- Decision making authority lies with the Town (Town meeting vote)
- Approval from the Commissioner of the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education
- Time Frame: 2 to 3 years

Regionalization - Amesbury/Georgetown

Pros

- Maintain Governance
- Approximately 75% of students continue to be educated in Georgetown
- Peer Groups: Increased graduating class size
- Opportunities
 - Sports
 - Extracurricular activities
 - Academic Electives
- Pride in sports and community involvement
- Sustainable over time even with declining enrollment

Cons

- Lack of Timeliness
- Impact on the small town feel for secondary students
- Location for some students -
 - Transported out of Georgetown
